RAMBLING

To new members who are thinking of heir first walk, the following hints on equement may be of help. To regular members, please pass on the information when asked by a newcomer.


Starting at ground-level - FOOTWEAR that gives strong support to the ankle, water-proof, (least number of seams help here), and a sole that will give a good grip either nails or rubber of the Vibram or Commando type. (Soak well in oil or dubbin when new). At least two pairs of socks - preferably wool - which should prevent blisters.

For men TROUSERS of windproof and hadwearing material - the ideal being one of the corded cloth. The ladies seem to prefer jeans or trews which are much better than skirts or frocks, but men's wear for this item gives much more freedom for leg movement. A long-sleeved woollen garment, PULLOVER, with a crew neck is essential for warmth - on top of which an ANORAK will keep out cold winds. The hood of the latter should be shaped and have a drawcord - all zips are a source of draught, unless they are covered. BOBCAPS are the rage at the moment - as well as being decorative, they serve the useful purpose of a skull-cap. Last, but by no means least, a small RUCKSACK - broad webting straps, and waterproof - inside of which will be a dry change of clothing, as well as any other necessities - food, etc., for a trouble-free and happy day in the countryside.

There will be enquiries made among Lembers as to their willingness to lead one or more rambles during the summer. Leading is by no means a small labour of love, but one of vital importance to the continuation of our main activity - giving untold pleasure to those who follow in his footsteps. 
Look out for joint walks in near future - clubs from North, South, East & West!
