WHAT'S THIS SPONSORED WALK ALL ABOUT

On the 29th. April the L.J.R.A. are having a sponsored walk in aid of Jospice International.(St. Joseph's Hospice Association.) This is a loc al Organisation which has for the past 10 years been caring for the destitute incurable sick.

Jospice International was founded 10 years ago by a Crosby priest Father Francis O'Leary. He was working as a teacher in a place called Rawalpindi in West Fakistan. The plight of the destitute sick was a constant heartache to him and particularly when one woman was brought to him and he could not get the local hospital to care for her. He resolved that he would build a hospital for the destitute sick. In November 1962 the first group of the Association was founded in a mud hut in Rawalpindi with it's first donation of 75p. In 1964 with the combined help of the group in Pakistan and a group in Crosby the first hospital was opened.

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Father O'Leary felt that if this could be achived for one group of people then itwas possible to put up more hospitals. He asked the Fransican Missionaries who were working in Rawalpindi, where they felt the next hospital ought to be situated. They suggested a small village on the Caribbean coastline called the San Bernardo Del Viento. This village had approximately 30,000 inhabitants and practically no medical care. The hospital was opened in 1968 and is at the moment staffed by a fine group of lay volunteers.

Father O'Leary then moved down to Peru, at the request of a friend Father Vincent Hughes. He asked father to site his next hospital in a place called Negritos which is situated in the desert in the North of Feru. This hospital opened in 1970 and is being administered by the Sisters of Notre Dame who are carrying out social, educational and catechetical work.

At the request of the Peruvian Government the next two hospitals were sited in Peru, one in the North of Lima in the port of Calloa, the other in Villa El Salvador which is a vast sandbank just outside Lima. Here the Association has the task of caring for at least 200,000 people who were the victims of the earthquake in 1970. These poor people own literally all they stand up in.

With so many people to care for abroad any ordinary man would feel that he was doing his bit, but Father O'Leary is also aware of the need of the destitute sick at home. In November last year he aquired some property at Thornton, at a cost of £90, 000. He hopes to open his first hospital there later this year.

And so the work goes on at ever increasing pace - a boat for a mobile dispensary on the River Amazon, a hospital for Chile and perhaps another in the North of Peru.

Father O'Leary is one of the few people who has acted upon Fope Faul the sixths Encyclical ' Fopulorum Frogressio '--We must make hast Too many are suffering and the distance is growing that separates the progress of some and the stagnation, not to say the depression of others.

Now you know a little about the organisation who will benefit by our support which you can give in one of two ways:-

- a) To take part in the walk.
- b) To sponsor one of your friends or colleagues
 - to the extreem of your generosity.

Our Vice Iresident, Cyril Kelly has written a few words which are directed at you ! But most important, THINK and RESPOND in a FOSITIVE manner.

Dear Friends,

Elsewhere in this issue you will see details of what is planned for the above walk, so this is just to ask you to take part - yes you and you and you'. We would like to see 100% of the nenbership on this walk, with all the workers from St Joseph's Hospice who can put one foot in front of the other. The funds raised will never go to a better cause- the care of the destitute, and the incurably sick. Not all of us can look after these people, but your efforts on this walk can count as one of your corporal works of nercy, and the money raised will be of great assistance to those nurses and other helpers who are doing the work which we cannot do ourselves.

So please turn up at the meeting point on Sunday 29th April. Get your sponsor sheet as soon as possible, and get a many of you relatives and friends to sponsor you for a specific amount per mile, and then come along and walk as far as you can, Each mile you do will mean just that little extra for the funds

I appeal particularly to those who never come out on a ramble. Make an supreme for ton this one occasion. As every mile is left behind you, just spare a thought for those unfortunate thousands who will never be able to walkagain, and whose grateful prayers will be offered in thanks for your help.

Even if, after all, you find you cannot walk, then perhaps you could offer your services as a steward, or maybe your car for helping to get people home. But most of all be ready to sponsor the walkers for as much as you possibly can, until it hurts, so that we can all look proudly back on our efforts for the Hospice on April 29th 1973.

After Sunday Mass, and after collecting their packed lunches, the energetic 8 went on their ramble. I and several others decided, after our (cooked) lunch


