IN AUGUST 1966 The Social side was "quieter" and, to quote Gerry Penlington, the Editor, "an increase in membership was needed" he emphasiscd a fact which is tmue today ass it was then ... "you can attend socials for years and not know anyone, attend one Rarible and you know everybody," he concluded with an appeal - "bring or send along one new member - not as a favour to us but as a favour to the Newcomer."
IN JUIY 1967,6 Ramblers conquered the 14 peaks of Snowdonia to celebrato the 40 th Anniversary of the L.C.li.A. ALSO the club moved its base from the Cathedral Buildines to the Design Centre, Hope Street. $\qquad$
ON 9RII AUGUST 1968 Nine girls from the club were killed when the plane takino then on holiday to Seefeld in Austric crashed on a German Autobalno (May they rest in peace)
