

FOOD GLORIOUS FOOD

In recent months on many 'B' rambles a certain member has been having cake at the buttie stops, we have all sampled this wonderful cake and it is about time we all had the opportunity to make it ourselves seeing how it is so nourishing and easy to make so here goes.

Ted's Tiffin Cake

Ingredients.

8 oz Rich Digestive Biscuits 3 Tablespoons of Drinking Chocolate 2 Dessertspoons of Golden Syrup 3½ oz Margerine 4oz Mixed Fruit 6oz Cake Chocolate.

Method.

Crush biscuits till fine.

- Add drinking chocolate and mixed fruit and mix together.
- Melt margerine and mix in.
 Add golden syrup and mix in.
- 4. Add golden syrup and mix in.
 5. Melt cake chocolate and mix in.
 6. Spread on a flat baking tray lined with greaseproof paper.
 7. Put in fridge until set.

This seems very easy to make, with no possibility of going wrong for even the worst cook. I've been told the only possible danger of it going wrong is if the cake chocolate is burnt when added to the mixture. There, the ingredients and method let's see more Tiffin cake on the walks.

RAMBLERITE (Recent Rambles)

Pike o' Blisco, Sunday llth June (or Pike of Blisco on Sundays - See Wainwright).

Another "two coach" excursion. There were five walks of varying standard. Paul led a low level walk from Skelwirth through the Langdale Valley to Dungeon Ghyll. Colin led another easy walk starting from Elterwater also finishing at Dungeon Ghyll. Daphne and her party left the coach at Ambleside and successfully tackled Wansfell Pike to Troutbeck village returning to Ambleside via Jenkin Crag which in the bright sunlight must have given good clear views of Windermere and the woods around Sawrey and Hawkshead. (Beatrix Potter Country). Mike's A walk went over Pike of Blisco (note Sunday title!) to Red Tarn and then up to the foot of Bowfell via Crinkle Crags including the infamous "Bad Step". The final walk which I led was to the summit of Rossett Pike via Rossett Gill and thence to the Langdale Pike returning via Stickle Ghyll.

Haystacks - July 2nd

A new area for Sunday coaches although we have been before when staying at Lakeside House. The A walk proceeded to Haystacks via Honister House and then on to Green Gable via Brandreth. The return was via Gillercomb and Sourmilk Gill to Seathwaite in glorious sunshine, its hard to believe this is the wettest village in Britain when you see it as it was this day.

Llanberis - 16th July

Four walks were held. The A and B walks both started from Pen-y-Pass and ascended Snowdon by different routes meeting at the summit. The A route was via Crib Goch and Crib-y-ddysgl whilst the B used the more direct and less taxing Pyg Track although in the hot conditions of the day this was enough for many. The A+ walk intended to tackle Snowdon via the "Snowdon Ranger" path but in the conditions found the route too long for the available time.
