

Method: Sample the whisky and check for quality. Take a large bowl. Check the whisky again to be sure it is of the highest quality. Pour one level cup and drink. Repeat. Turn on the electric mixer, beat one cup of butter and beat again. Make sure the whisky is still OK. Cry another tup. Turn off the mixer. Break two leggs and add to the bowl and chuck in the cup of dried fruit. Mix on the turner. If the fruit gets stuck in the beaters, pry it loose with a drawscriver. Sample the whisky again to check for tonsisticity. Next, sift two cups of salt, or something, who cares? Check the whisky. Now sift the lemon juice and strain your nuts. Add one babblespoon of brown sugar, or whatever colour you can find. Wix mel. Grease the oven. Turn the cake pan to 350 gradees. Do not forget to beat off the turner. Throw the bowl out of the window, check the whisky again, and bo to ged.

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PICOS DE EUROPA - August 1991

When our daughters Maureen and Elaine returned from a holiday in Northern Spring one summer they enthused about the green countryside and the absence of commercialisation. This sounded very inviting. So, this year Norman and I chose a brack from a Brittany Ferries brackure.

To break our journey we arranged an overnight stay at the "Bowling Green Hotel", Flymouth as we wandered around it was possible to visualise certain historic events: Sir Francis Drake standing on Plymouth Hoe and looking out to sea, The Filgrim Fathers boarding the "Mayflower" and the press gangs in New Street (a narrow alleg with Elizabethan-style buildings) forcing their victims to take to the High Seas.

The sun shone as we boarded the "Bretagne", a ferry which has facilities that make it more like a cruise ship, thus making the 23-hour journey more comfortable (also the waters in the Bay of Biscay were calm). On arrival at Santander, raincoats gave an indication of the weather. It remained dull and the skies were overcast as we drove through the mountain gorge, Desfiladero de la Hermida which claims to be the second deepest gorge in the world, after the Grand Canyon. Was this sunny Spain!

Then the sun broke through and the blue skies were smiling down on us. In less than three hours we had reached our destination. Before us was the rural hide-away "Hotel del Oso", set in the foothills of the Picas de Europa (also known as the Spanish Alps).

Refreshed by a night's sleep, we donned our walking boots, etc and looked for the path which led to the next village and was used regularly by the locals. Rula, a dog from the hotel, was our companion. As the path became steeper the foliage provided a welcome shade and we could see birds of prey hovering above the tree-line. Suddenly there was no shade at all and the sun was fiercely beating down on us. This was typical of "Mad dogs and Englishmen",

The birds of prey were now below us. Spectacular views surrounded us as we looked down into the valley towards our hotel. In the opposite direction the village roof-tops were visible but still seemed to be a great distance away. The paths twisted and turned. Once again there was shade — and mud from a dried-up mountain stream — Were we lost? There were no "Public Footpath" signs to be seen here. Still we kept on going. At last there was a pathway ahead which led to two buildings, on the outskirts of the village. A left turn revealed an oasis, "identified by the word "BAR", set in the authentic Spanish village of Pembes. No English was spoken by the bar owner or his customers. However, "Das Cerveza" were served quickly and tasted like nectar.

An alternative route along the main road took us back to "Hotel del Oso" (Hotel of the Bear). A swim in the pool, a shower and an "a la carte" meal were the finishing touches to a very different and interesting day. An ash tray filled with aqua was the reward for our faithful friend Rula.

Two days later we travelled 25 kms to Fuente De. Here we took a cable car up the sheer side of a mountain a further 2,500 feet from the valley. At the top are some truly breathtaking views. The peaks of the mountains themselves are covered with snow for the majority of the year. Mules tracks led to the snow. En route we saw sheep, horses, mountain goats, cattle and eagles. However, the chamois, deer, badger, fox, wild boar and occasional bear, were more likely to have been seen by those who hired jeeps and drove further into the restricted hunting reserve.

Next time we intend to have a longer holiday and travel out to the North West Coast.
