The recent tragedy on Snowdon, when three boys were killed, emphasises the potential danger which exists.on British mountains. The incident took place a short distance from the surmit cafe, where the Pyg track joins the railway, in a position which would not normally be considered dangerous. (For those unfamiliar with Snowdon, the place concerned was shown in the film which we made last year). The lesson for all of us is clear; everyone venturing onto the mountains must wear suitable footwear and have warm clothing. Leaders should be prepared to turn back should conditions warrant it.

Lest anyone should be deterred from joining our activities, however, the above facts should be kept in perspective. A small handfull of people each year die on the mountains, mainly as a result of rock-climbing, and cxpeditions such as that which resulted in the Cairngorm disaster. Seven thousand people die every year on our roads, and many more in the alleged "safety" of. their owr homes. Ovur two hưndred people are murdered every year in fingland, Scotland and Wales. While, the dangers of the mountrins cannot:be: ignored, they should not be exaggersited either. Our club, in. forty-five years of existence, has had only one serious accident.

In ordor to ensure paximum safety for our members, we are arranging for on exhibition of rambling equipment to be held at the Clubrooms, organised by Ellis Brigham's.

If you havo not been rambling lately, you have missud some very enjoyable walks. On February 6th, eddie Webb led one of the most pleasant rambles for some time up Penyghent. It was a pity that only eight members attonded. The following week, hovever, Maigaret Smith's hotpot ramble to Llanarmon was very successful, and attracted the largest attendance we have had for some time. "Forhaps sone more ladies. will bé encouraged by Margaret's success, and will join the Rambling Sub-Committee.
