



Over the years, in conjunction mainly with the Newcastle Catholic Ramblers, we have kept the house going, and have provided our share of the members on the Management Committee, Unfortunately in recent years, for reasons known best to our nembers, the Newcastle Club has had to provide the bulk of the Management Conmittee. A lot of the decorations at the house  $a_{re}$  done by the connittee, and you would be asked if you could help.





An extract is included below. CONTRACT OF EMPLOYMENT 1974 (revised) Due to the excessive number of absences during the past it has become necessary to put the following new rules and procedures into operation immediately. 1. SICKNESS-No excuse. The Management will no longer accept your

- 1. <u>SICKNESS-No excuse</u>. The Management will no longer accept your Doctor's note as proof: We believe that if you are able to go to your Doctor, you are able to attend for work.
- 2. <u>DEATH (Your own)</u>. This will be accepted as an excuse. However, we should like two weeks-notice, since we feel it is your duty to train someone else for your job.
- 3. <u>DEATH (Other than your own)</u>. This is no excuse. There is nothing you can do for them and henceforth no time off will be allowed for funerals. However, in case this should cause hardship to some of our employees, there are those who might care to note that on your behalf the Management has a special scheme in conjunction with the local council for lunch-time burials thus ensuring that no time is lost from work.
- 4. LEAVE OF ABSENCE FOR AN OPERATION We wish to discourage any thoughts you may have on needing an operation and henceforth no leave of absence will be granted for Hospital visits. The management believes that we engaged you for your particular job as a perfect speciman and therefore we cannot allow you to 'bperate" as a not quite perfect speciman. You will require your limbs and brain at all times. Removal of same cannot therefore be considered.
- 5. <u>VISITS TO THE CONVENIENCE</u>. Far too much time is spent on this particular practice. In future the procedure will be that all personnel shall go in alphabetical order. E.g. Those with the surname beginning with the letter "A" will go at 9.30 a.m., B. 9.45 a.m. C. at 10 a.m. etc.

<u>NOTE</u> - Those of you who are unable to attend at the appropriate time will have to wait until the next day when your turn comes again.

By the time the coach had reached Llangollen the leader, Anna Kupiec decided that a tea-break was in order and the ramblers proceeded to scandalize the local traders by patronising their somewhat sophisticated tearooms in full rambling gear.
