## Safety on Rambles:

Many so called "ramb?es" are held in mountainous areas and a few comansense precautions are necessary for the safety and serijoyment of those using the countryside.

CLOTHING lfost isaportant is correct footwear whicinis esseritia- botis for ankle protection and grip on slippery surfaces. Boots with a good tretd and fitt'ing comfortabiy are a must for all rambles. The - leader can refuse to take a person on a rainibé if he conisiders that person is incorrectly dressed. Warm and waterproof clothing sust always be taken even on a hot, sumig day as weather can deteriorate in sountainous areas in a:matter of manutes., They ishould be cairried in a well-fitting rucksack when not worn. A complete chamge of clothes should also be taken, but please, not carried on the ramble but left in the coach.

Food ...The best wray to get erergy is to eat and a picnic lunch should 3e-carried with plenty to drink eespecially during the summer months.

DISCIPLINE The leader is. in ciarge frou the moment they Etep on the coach at Liverpool and no merberray leave. the party without othe leader's sanction: If any netiber decides not to take part in a ranble on arrival at the destination, they inst inform the coach driver of their intention to stay with the coack. In the uilikely event of anyone getting separated without the iededer's'or 'the rhipper-iti's'tinowledge they must get in touch with tie coach driver as soon as posibible or - if lost dial the LOCAL POLICE immediately so that contact can be made. No responsibi?ity can be taken fow persons leaving ${ }^{*}$ party without the leader!s sanction In the case pf an accident dial 999 so that police can contact the nearest zopuntain rescue team..
EQUIPMENT Torches, first-aid, camasses, maps, whistles, etc. are carried by all leaders. Ifembers should carry at least a torch and vinistle in case of emergency:

CAER CARADOCHILL

After an uneventful journey apartfrom a cafe stop at Whitchurch, we arrived at our destination, Chunch Stretton.

For those who do not know, Caer Caradoc Hill is one of the Six Summits of Shropshire, these undulating uplands rise out of the surrounding plains to form an unusual yet impressive sky line.

The walk started under the threat of rain. We crossed a river and entered a field which proved to be very slippy. Crossing a style we left the field by a gate and followed a muddy path. Here we gained a guide in the form of a sheep dog.

Up a steep hill we went, though it was hard going at least we had left the mud behind.
