

Ask the conductor for "The Triangle". All members are very cordially invited to join whether they are players or not. Non-players wishing to learn the rudiments of the game are assured of every assistance from the Committee, and as several of the members have voiced their willing-ness to share their racquets, that should overcome the difficulty of those who do not possess one at present.
