

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MALHAM JOINT WALK, 16TH FEBRUARY, 1986.

On leaving Liverpool on a dry, overcast morning, we were transported to the arctic wastes of North Yorkshire and Malham in particular. That we ever arrived at all was due entirely to the skills of our driver, who had to negotiate many miles of twisting country roads and one very narrow bridge.

The hills surrounding Malham were entirely covered in snow and it was so cold that every available article of clothing had to be worn.

After passing through the willage we proceeded in the direction of Malham Cove, which is a site well worth seeing. It was the intention to climb up alongside the former waterfall but conditions were so bad that our leaders decided to climb the path to the side of the Cove. This was quite hazardous in itself due to snow and ice, and many of the party experienced their first falls of the day. On attaining the top, we were able to view and cross the Limestone Pavement. This can be difficult to cross in normal circumstances, but with snow filling the gaps between the limestone, one had to step very warily.

Having passed through two more snowfilled valleys, we eventually arrived at Malham Tarn. We would not have known it was there, had it not been pointed out to us. It was frozen over and covered with snow, which blended in with the surrounding countryside.

Once again, the planned walk had to be altered as conditions on the exposed plateau were atrocious. The wind was whipping up the snow so reducing visibility, and the ground conditions rapidly fluctuated between soft deep snow, hard snow and very slippery ice, the last being the worst of the lot. It was at this point that we passed the 'A' team. After much effort, we eventually gained the luxury of a single track road, which had been ploughed and salted, and for the first time enjoyed the feel of terra firma beneath our feet.

Our coach journey back took us on a grand tour of North Yorkshire and Lancashire, eventually stopping at Farrington for usual refuelling. That this ever occurred is amazing, as our navigator, Dave, took us through the town twice and twice round two roundabouts. A sight to behold. As sherpa McDonald said afterwards, he would not have missed that walk for all the world. With that sentiment we all agree.

Our grateful thanks to Moira and Norman for leading us and to all the others who helped to make it an unforgettable day.
