

RAMBLERITE

Since the last newsletter there have been three rambles:

Jan 24: MACCLESFIELD FOREST. A well-filled coach to the Cat & Fiddle from whence both walks commenced. The 'A' walk, led by Mike O'Shea (a late replacement leader, thanks Mike) took the Goyt Valley route over undulating country to the ruins of Errwood Hall, and the newer Errwood Reservoir which covers the original Goyt Valley and then on to the older Reservoir and the lower slopes of Shining Tor. A very select party of six completed this pleasant 12-13 mile walk, returning just before darkness fell. The 'B' party was very large in number, over 40, led by Paul Healy*. Everybody who was on this outing en byed themselves and the Imperial Hotel at Prescot rounded off a perfect day.

*More leaders are required so that parties of large sizes can be split to a more convenient and safer size.

Feb 7: LLANARMON HOT-POT RAMBLE. Both 'A' and 'B' walks started from the Clwyd Gate and finished at Llanarmon. The 'A' walk was exhilerating particularly as at the highest point along a ridge we were confronted by a snow storm. I believe the 'B' party also encountered problems in that the landlerd of the Druid Inn wasn't happy about their lunch stop being in his car park even though nobody of normal sanity would have sat outside a pub! Anyway the rest of their walk must have been very wet underfoot as at least half of them seemed to have cleaned their boots on my rucksack in the aisle of the coach on returning! The evening ended with an excellent hot-pot supper, at the Raven Inn. If you already have a 1989 diary please note that the next Llanarmon Hot-Pot is on Feb 12th 1989. It's too early to put your names down yet but don't forget the date!

Feb 14: SKEGGLES WATER. Almost all the people out on this walk had never heard of, and never seen. Skeggles Water, so in swirling mist both 'A' and 'B' walks started from Staveley to explore this lesser-known Lake District spot. After a little difficulty with indistinct footpaths, bogs and poor visibility both parties found, more by luck than anything else, the much sought-after Skeggles Water. The 'B' then took the shorter but loftier route to Kentmere passing patches of snow whist the 'A' moved downwards to Sadgill with fine views of the Longsleddale Valley (the mist having cleared by then). Rejoining the 'B' just before Kentmere the parties now had to cross a river that was in spate or alternatively make a five-minute detour over the road bridge. Many tried the former, some taking off boots to ford the ice-cold water. Then onwards we were rewarded by a very pleasant walk through the Kemtmere Valley to Staveley, and the coach. The break en route to Liverpool at Garswood was as usual, popular.

Editor's Note: Yesterday's walk to - Haworth was well attended with 39 turning out, first paying a short visit to the famous Bronte village now overdone with souvenir shops, etc. and scores of tourists, even at this time of year. Mike O'Connor led a good 'B' walk around the South and East of Haworth whilst I led the 'A' along part of the Bronte Way to the famous Bronte Bridge, then onto a short section of the PennineWay and back to Haworth. Both parties encountered a short 10-minute storm of snow/hailstone which was replaced by sunshine shortly afterwards. Both walks finished at 5.30.

April 1-4 EASTER WEEKEND. Caravans at Caernarfon will be used if sufficient interest.


