There are many organizations doing splendid work in the provision of Holidays for Youth both at home and abroad; some of them have their centres in every part of Europe. Their charges are reasonable, and their organization of walks and excursions is effcient to the very finest degree. Truly a marvellous holiday may be had by those to whom such institutions appeal. such institutions appeal. But what of the spiritual aspect of these organizations? Certainly none of them is Catholic; some indeed are definitely anti-Catholic, their Godless outlook being evident to those of our Faith who have unfortunately given their patronage to them in the past. Others we find are directly or indirectly controlled by the 'Church of England', the 'Free Churches', and so on. Is it right then that Catholics should continue to support these bodies, when they could so easily have their own Holiday centres? In Great Britain there are sufficient Catholics to form an organization stronger and more attractive than all others to form an organization stronger and more attractive than all others combined. Let us all then, strive for Catholic Holidays for Catholics. Soon this movement will attract our fellow Catholics not only in England, Wales, Scotland and Ireland; not only in Europe, but in America too, and Africa, Australia, New Zealand. The Church is Universal: then let our cry ring out loudly round the whole world - "CATHOLIC HOLIDAYS FOR CATHOLICS!" A big task, admittedly, and one that will take years, generations, to fulfil. But them, did not far greater difficulties confront out forefathers in spreading the Faith? And, in our common bond of Faith are we not already united to all our brother and sister Catholics beyond the seas, though whose lands we have never seen? Here surely we have more claim to their support than any of the non-Catholic organizations that are so easerly and so rapidly spreading their influence organizations that are so eagerly and so rapidly spreading their influence across the face of Europe. hose the Patronage of His Grace the Archbishop of Liverpool. What is the first step to be taken in this gigant is movement? It is the establishment of our Holiday Centres in the British Isles. That we will have at least the moral support of the Faithful of this country is evident by the hundreds of letters of encouragement received during the year 1939. That our s is the organization to which the task of providing Catholic Holidays should rightly fall is proved by the thirteen years of our existence by the wide experience we have gained in that time - by the fact that we are the only body which has seriously tackled the provision of walking holidays for Catholics of both sexes. Perhaps in the past we might have shown more ambition in drawing up holiday programmes, and we might have given more prominence to our schome. That defect was to a great extent overcome this year, and now we are grasping the problem: with both hands, as it were, and are getting down to business. This year, it is well known, we rented four different contres in Ambleside, and had with us well over two hundred guests from every corner of Britain. But a different and more progressibe policy was to be adopted in 1940, and we seek to equire our own centres. The type it is our aim to establish is that which can accommodate upwards of fity people; which has gardens, pleasure grounds, tennis courts &c. The houses would be comfortably furnished on a set standard, and only the very best food would be served. In fact, we are setting ourselves out to provide something even better than a 'home from home', if that is possible. Special attention will be paid to the management of the houses. It is our plan to retain a resident host and hostess at each one - perhaps a young married couple with experience in Hotels and social work, and with a bright outlook on things. The hostess in particular would supervise the household and internal organization, while it would be the duty of the host to lead walks in the vicinity and to acquaint the parties of any points of interest - historical or otherwise - which may be chats on any appropriate subject with which they were conversant, some piece of archiology, for instance, or perhaps an unusual specimen of floral growth. Such talks are in fact indispensible if a walk is to be enjoyed too the full. Cortain days of the week would be set aside for excursions to some distant town or resort which had a special attraction. Every evening there would be a social gathering, with music, games, denoing and so on, and Friday evening would be devoted to a grand farewell party for those who were to leave for home that week-end. A Fancy Dress Ball would be appropriate heretoo. The ideal would be to open the houses all the year round, and reunion parties would be held at Christmas and Easter.

All the beautiful country resorts would have our first attention - the Derbyshire Dales, lovely Lakeland, the rugged coast of Western Scotland, the mountains of Wales; Deven Cornwall, Ireland, and by no means least, the Isle of Man. The desirability of a Catholic Holiday Centre in London itself is well known to us; this too will have our carly attention. They have only to let us know, and if we think the suggested area would be an attraction, then certainly we will be only too pleased to take the matter up. And now may we turn again to the question of Catholic Holidans abroad. This problem cannot of course be seriously dealt with a abroad. This problem cannot of course be soriously dealt with a for several years to come, but we are determined to do something about it now! Copies of this News-Letter, and an outline of our canpaign, are being sent to Catholic Youth leaders in every English speaking country in the world - Canada, United States, Parts of Africa, Australia, New Zealand, and so on, and they are being invited to carry on the campaign in their countries. We are collating all information on existing facilities for Catholic Holidays abroad, so that when the time for action arrives we will know exactly how our 'foreign policy' should be shaped. Later we will communicate with Catholic bodies in all European countries, and then gradually there will be built up one of the greatest movements for Catholic Youth that the world has ever seen.

Intercommunication between Catholics of the different nations has always been sadly lacking. This is not as it should be, and it will be our aim to cultivate international Catholic friendship. The exchange of holiday parties with European countries will be an important plank in our activities. Full prominence, therefore, will be given to all replies received from abroad, and the News-Letter will in future be sent each month to all our foreign correspondents, and they too are invited to send us articles for publication.

Language Classes?

We hope to assist in the establishment of a Catholic Rambling Club which organizes weekly Rambles and Socials (similar to our own Club) in all towns and Cities in the United Kingdom. And then, how easy it would be to form a small language class in these Clubs to pick up at least a smattering of French, or German, or Spanish, or Italian, to enable us to converse with our fellow Catholics from other countries whom perhaps we would meet the following year! The return of peace may well bring with it a prosperity that will permit of much shorter hours and longer holidays for workers - for such was the trend of industrial England before the war commenced. This will mean probably a reduction of travelling fares by sea and rail, and thus holidays abroad would soon become possible for everyone even of the most modest means; certainly it would be a possibility for the thrifty, who provide for their holidays out of their weekly salaries. We hope to assist in the establishment of a Catholic Rambling Club holidays out of their weekly salaries.

And so we think the establishment of Catholic Holidays abroad too is only a question of time. We want our foreign centres to be substantially of the same standard as those at home. The quality of food, the comforts, the attention, these must certainly be maintained at a very high level.

There must be many countries which we have all longed to visit at some time or other - Switzerland, Italy, Holland, France, Spain, and even America. It is up to us to make Holidays abroad possible. It can be done - through God and His Church; through Catholic Action; through Catholic Fellowship.

Publicity

We have in mind many methods by which Catholic Holidays are to be advertised, but most important of these is our Film Campaign. Actual moving pictures will be taken of parties at our centres, and with shots of the surrounding countryside we will make up quite an interesting show. This film will be exhibited in Church Halls up and down the country, and one of our officials will be at hand to give a running commentary. I ST KNELLY
